Women's racing has truly come of age in this part of Santa Clara Valley. After 15 years of taking part in co-ed events, local and area women had a road race of their very own.

Within the past three years, women's events have been held in every metropolitan area of the

After standing around and chatting for 15 minutes prior to the starting time instead of warming up, the athletes got down to serious business once the races began.

Leticia Ancheta led all of the women entrants in the 2K with a time of 7:51 to easily win the youth division as well as the race itself. Christine Helms came in second in the race and first in the open division.

The more serious runners chose to compete in either the 5 or the 10K events. Lori Medlau led 95 women to the finish of the race and in the process won the open division with a time of 20:38. Sue Frances clocked in at 21:00 flat to win the sub-master's division while race veteran Diane Bromstead came in third overall and first in the master's division.

Christine Strandberg led all participants in the 10K with a time of 42:04 over the windy and hilly San Martin course. Donn Troyna took second overall and first in the sub-masters division while Liz Applegate won the open division (Christine Strandberg entered the youth division).

Jeanne Spencer, who directed the race for the Morgan Hill Chapter of the American Association of University Women, was extremely pleased with
