
Wildflower Run blossoms in MH

Grant Fuhriman planned to run the Wildflower Run in Morgan Hill Saturday, rain or shine. Justin Christopher didn't know he was going to run the 10K race until one half hour before it started.

But both runners toed the starting line at Live Oak High at 9 a.m. Saturday and proceeded to battle for four miles before Fuhriman pulled away for a win in the 6.2-mile event.
"I turned into the wind and

figured I'd surge on him and see if he would surge," said Fuhriman about his race strategy. "This is a great race. It's real beautiful, and the scenery kept the pain to a minimum."

Approximately 520 people participated in the Wildflower Run, which also includes a 2K race and a 5K walk. The 10K run, which drew 248 people, starts and finishes at Live Oak and winds around the servers. and winds around the campus before looping near Anderson Dam on Coyote Road and Peet

Road.
Fuhriman, a former cross country and track runner at Brigham Young University who now lives in Mountain View, won the race in 35 minutes, 15 seconds. Christopher, a senior at Live Oak, set a personal record of 35:25 with his second-place finish. place finish.

Karen Rowen of San Jose was the top female finisher, as she placed ninth overall with a fine time of 37:52.2.

A pack of six runners raced through the first mile together, but Fuhriman and Christopher dropped the rest of the pack during the second mile, which they crossed in 11:16.

stayed together despite encoun-Road. The lone 150-meter hill near the three-mile point, which has been a key spot to make a move in the past, had no effect on either runner.

"(Christopher) was smooth, and I knew that this wasn't his first race," said the 26-year-old Fuhriman. "I expected a sprint to the finish."

But as Fuhriman made a left turn onto Peet Road at the 41/2mile point, he threw in a surge against the wind. Christopher was unable to respond. "When we turned (off) Cochrane, he put 10 feet on me and got me down Peet," said Christopher. "I just tried to stay ahead of the other guy."

The other guy was Keith Medlund, who placed third in 35:41. Don Jedlover was fourth in 35:59 and Gordon Travis fin-

ished fifth in 36:16.

Rowen ran alone throughout the race, and said that a 15hour work day Friday drained

her of energy Saturday.
"I'm tired, but I wanted to run," said Rowen, who works as a printer for the Palo Alto Medical Foundation. "The people are

always friendly here."

Debbie Holst, a local chiropractor, was the second female finisher in 39:27. Holst, who won the Big Basin half-marathon only a week before, decided to run the Wildflower Run instead of defending her title in the Capital 10,000 in Austin, Texas.
